

#### A MILESTONE AS AUCA WINS THE BIG PRIZE OF PEACE IN RWANDA

An inter-universities competition that was organized by the Pan-African Organization for Peace and Conflicts Resolution ended with exciting news for the entire AUCA community after the latter scooped the trophy. The final contest took place at the East African University Rwanda on 13th September, 2024. The competition was about showcasing essay writing skills and public speaking skills.

At the very beginning seven universities qualified to compete in the first stage, namely the Adventist University of Central Africa, Kigali Independent University ULK, University of Kigali, University of Lay Adventists of Kigali, Mount Kigali University, East African university Rwanda, and the University of Tourism Technology and Business Studies. Two universities did not make it to the final stage as they were knocked out in the first stage.

The Adventist University of Central Africa, represented by Mr. Ezekiel Nzuki, from the Faculty of Theology, qualified for the last round with the first slot after all judges unanimously declared him best essayist and speaker of the first stage. With this win, he had to go to the last stage which took place on 13th September, 2024.



Five contestants who qualified for the final stage are from the Adventist University of Central Africa, East African University Rwanda, University of Kigali, University of Lay Adventists of Kigali and Kigali Independent University ULK. At this stage, the contestants were requested to choose a topic that is related to peace and link it with African development.

Mr. Nzuki, AUCA contestant, chose a topic on girl child education as a way of fast tracking the Africa's development. As he said, Africa cannot develop at a faster pace if women are left behind.

"Statistics reveal that Rwanda has made considerable progress ever since the leadership opted for women empowerment policy. We therefore need to take the same initiative to the rest of the continent if we aspire to have a developed and stable Africa"





### Unity Club Intwararumuri delivers a Public Lecture at **AUCA**



# Historic Event as the Construction of New Female Students Hostels and Postgraduate School Complex is flagged off


